## **Successful Marriages**

Many marriages begin with bad ideals. Marriage was never set up to serve you or your spouse. It was set up to be God's gift to you in demonstration of Christ's love for the Church (Ephesians 5:31–33). If you are married, God chose you to be this marvelous example. But how does it work?

First it starts with having the right frame of mind. Successful marriages never begin and end with the noble desire to get married. The joy of marriage only takes place when there is a realization that the relationship includes work. No successful marriage ever works on its own. It requires hard work from both parties. You both made the decision to get married, and must both be willing to work towards your relationship's success.

Marriage also requires the realization that neither of you are perfect. It is the beauty and the challenge of your differences which illustrates the miracle of marriage. Opposites attract. Sometimes after you've said the magic words, "I do!" you find out just how opposite you are. The blessing of marriage is you each make up for the part that is missing in the other person.
