- Do you feel our country is more or less safe after the 9/11 attacks?
- Do you feel the world is more or less safe since 9/11?
- Do you feel Islamic extremism is more or less of a threat now?
- Do you feel other world powers, namely Russia, Iran, and China, are more or less hostile toward the United States now?
- Do you feel more or less confident in our government's ability to protect the US from an attack by our enemies?
- Do you feel political partisanship has made effective change in our social, military, and foreign policy more or less possible?
- Do you feel the Iranian nuclear deal will make the world more or less safe?
- Do you feel the constitutional rights and concerns of Christians are acknowledged more or less by the government now?
- Do you feel the government is more or less likely to plead for the release of imprisoned, overseas, American Christians?

If you answered "less" to most or all of these questions, then you have sided with the 47% of Americans who believe our country is less safe now than before the 9/11 attacks. With the chain reaction caused by ISIS beheadings of American, European, Middle Eastern, and Christian captives, it's no surprise we feel this way.

Acts of aggression are happening closer to home as well. Consider this shocking news piece from September 2: "Navy Commander Bill Urban, a Pentagon spokesman, confirmed to Fox News Wednesday [September 2] that three surface warfare ships, one amphibious assault ship and one supply vessel from the People's Liberation Army [of China] Navy had been sighted in the Bering Sea. It was the first time that Chinese ships had been seen in the body

of water separating Alaska and Russia."

Our enemies are getting bolder. The world is growing more dangerous. It's the perfect time to shake in our boots, right? Only if our hopes rest in our government.

Changes in our country, culture, and world may dismay us. Christians may choose to respond to the troubles of our times with worry and fear, but this is only a choice; it is not the only choice available. Choice implies alternatives. A better choice would be to view our country and world through a different lens, one where God looms large on the horizon of our daily experiences.
