Like the human body which has many individual parts, everyone in Christ forms a part of His spiritual body on Earth. Through the life-giving power of the Holy Spirit, the individual parts can function as a whole. Our gifts may be different, but they work together for His purpose in the world.

Yet without an understanding of our purpose, we will be lost on the train like Einstein.

The Ruse of What Matters Most

ing-dong," the doorbell chimes.

A man in a baseball cap, button-down shirt, work pants and work shoes stands outside. You take a quick look through the window and then open the door. "Hi, how can I help you?"

"The village is doing inspections on home water lines after the recent storm. Can you show me where yours is located?"

"Sure, it's out back." You grab your shoes, close the front door behind you and lead the worker to the back of your house.

When you return, you find footprints inside but they aren't your own, or anyone else's in your family. A few items are missing from your jewelry box. Your wallet is gone.

You feel betrayed and cheated. You've just become the victim of a ruse burglary.

The Anatomy of a Ruse

Ruse victims are tricked into following someone they believe wants to help them. The perpetrator leads the victim to believe one thing is important so they will leave what is most important exposed. Another individual then comes behind the first and raids the house. The homeowner falls victim through distraction.

What Really Matters

Jesus said only two things matter in life: To love God with all our heart, soul and mind and to love our neighbor as ourselves (Matthew 22:37–40).

Practically speaking, loving God is recognizing Him as first. It is an eternal, heavenly perspective which sees Him as the Ruler of all things. It views all of life in light of His ultimate Kingdom purpose to bring glory to His name. Loving our neighbors is a perspective that values and prioritizes others, their needs and feelings.

When we are distracted from these all-important principles, which I'll refer to as first principles, we will fall for a spiritual ruse.

The Ruse of Conflict

The devil knows this, so he approaches our doorstep disguised as someone who wants to help us in our times of physical, emotional, relational or spiritual need. He steps into our chaos and confusion and quietly offers his tips for dealing with our conflicts:

- "It's never your fault. Always blame the other person."
- "Avoid the person or setting which caused the conflict and it will go away. Talking through problems is a waste of time and energy."
- "Don't forgive until they apologize. Grudges and resentment are the best way to show your anger."
- "Your perspective of the situation is all that matters. It doesn't matter that they see things differently. Trust your feelings — they're never wrong."
- "Even the score to win the game. You'll never defeat your opponent unless you make them pay for their wrongdoing."

Following this advice may feel good at first. We're standing up for our rights. We're being strong and not letting the other person take advantage of us. We're getting even. We're taking control of our destiny. We're winning....

All the while, our hearts are being robbed. Our preoccupation with the other person's actions leaves us feeling empty, betrayed and cheated out of the first principles which make for thriving relationships.

We've fallen for a ruse. And we've forgotten what really matters.

Ruse-Proofing Our Souls

In 2 Corinthians 2, the Apostle Paul wrote to Christians who had to address another believer's wrongdoing. Paul encouraged them to forgive and comfort him, reaffirming their love so he would not be overwhelmed by excessive sorrow. He warned their refusal to forgive this brother would play into Satan's trap to divide and conquer through distraction. "We are not ignorant of his designs," he said. (2 Corinthians 2:11)

Knowing our enemy's battle strategy will help us recognize his attacks when they come wrapped in the package of a difficult person, situation or setting. Rather than seeing these things as the enemy, we will see the devil as the source. This will give us discernment to see and care for the hurting people behind many of our conflicts. And it will remind us to pursue God's glory above our own, because He rules.

First principles (our love for God and others) help us recognize the enemy's deception by empowering us to own our mistakes, seek understanding and reconciliation, forgive others' offenses and trust God to right every wrong. In the end, this is what matters most. - Cam Edwards
